

Jonathan Patz, M.D., MPH

will receive the Homer N. Calver award and deliver a lecture titled “From the Margins to Mainstream: History of Climate Change in the Public Health Discourse” at the section’s luncheon. Dr. Patz is the Director of the Global Health Institute at the University of Wisconsin and is one of the Nation’s leaders in environmental public health who is best known for his work on climate change. For the past 15 years, Dr. Patz served as a lead author for the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the organization that shared the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize with Al Gore. He also co-chaired the health expert panel of the U.S. National Assessment on Climate Change. Dr. Patz has written over 90 peer reviewed scientific papers and a textbook addressing the health effects of global environmental change. In addition to directing the university-wide Global Health Institute, Dr. Patz has faculty appointments in the Nelson Institute, Center for Sustainability & the Global Environment (SAGE) and the Department of Population Health Sciences. Dr. Patz is double board-certified in Occupational/Environmental Medicine and Family Medicine and received his medical degree from Case Western Reserve University and his MPH from Johns Hopkins University.
