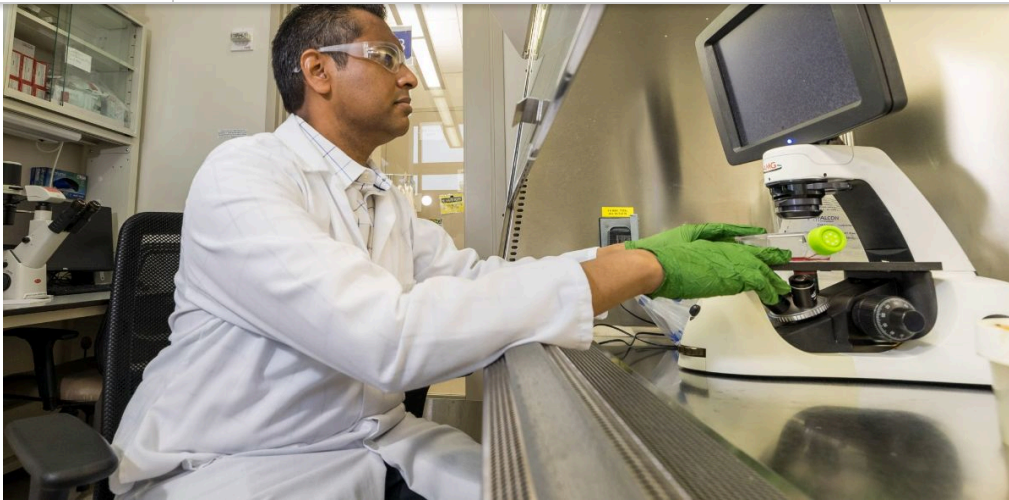

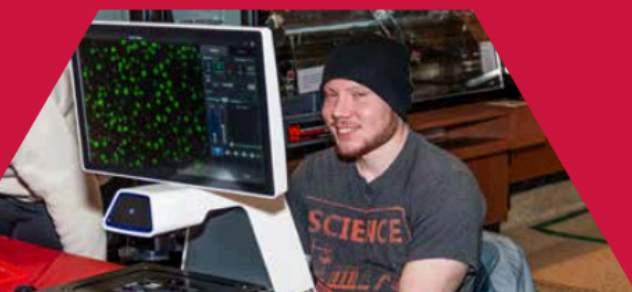

+ **BadgersVote:** Students eligible to vote in the 2025 spring election may register at their school address in Madison OR at their permanent address. Students voting in Wisconsin have several ways to register: Online until March 12 for those with a valid Wisconsin driver license or state ID; In person at a BadgersVote registration event; At an early voting location; At their assigned polling place on Election Day. Not all states will have elections this spring. Students voting outside Wisconsin should check important election dates, deadlines and ID requirements in their home state.
