## RECENT UW-MADISON RANKINGS



The University of Wisconsin–Madison was ranked 30th worldwide and 20th in the United States in the <u>2025 edition of the Global 2000 list</u> by consulting organization Center for World University Rankings (CWUR), putting UW in the top 0.2% of 21,462 ranked universities worldwide.

UW-Madison was also <u>ranked 41st worldwide and 24th in North America</u> in the Strategic Trends in Academic Global Excellence 2025 World University Rankings. UW-Madison Chancellor Jennifer L. Mnookin announced on Thursday, June 5, that Charles Isbell, Jr., who has served as UW-Madison's provost since 2023, <u>has been named the next chancellor of the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign</u> and a vice president of the University of Illinois System. Isbell will begin his new role on July 16.

John Zumbrunnen, Senior Vice Provost for Academic Affairs and Vice Provost for Teaching and Learning will serve as Interim Provost upon Isbell's departure.



Feroze has written and spoken extensively about surgical humanitarian work, the United States' role in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and the political consequences of medical relief work. He approaches the Israeli-Palestinian conflict as a secular American and as a humanitarian physician. Dr. Sidhwa will also be speaking at the Christ Presbyterian Church, 944 E. The Global Infectious Disease research training program addresses research training needs related to infectious diseases that are predominantly endemic in or impact upon people living in developing countries. The training programs include a variety of research training options to match the needs of the developing country institution. Program focus on a major endemic or life-threatening emerging infectious disease, neglected tropical disease, infections that frequently occur as a co-infection in HIV infected individuals, or infections associated with noncommunicable disease conditions of public health importance in LMICs. The ultimate goal is to build a critical mass of researchers and support staff to conduct independent infectious disease research in developing country institutions. Click here for more information.

traditionally provides small grant support for university-sponsored projects, with an emphasis on projects in the arts and humanities that may not have access to other funding, as well as projects identified by campus leadership as priorities of the institution. The Trust also supports innovative or experimental projects that may subsequently be funded through traditional sources, interdisciplinary activities, and special projects that contribute to the university's knowledge base or provide distinctive learning experiences. It is recommended that grant requests be in the \$2,000 - \$10,000 range. Larger grants may be considered on a case-by-case basis.
